I am mightily impressed by the way the management and staff have so thoughtfully responded to the various challenges faced, on many fronts, since the pandemic measures were put in place. The decision making has focused not just on keeping the children safe, but also how to mitigate the effect of safety measures on the children's experience and learning. This really illustrated to me that the bedrock of Thornbury Kinder is it's guiding philosophies. These are considered and followed not just when things are humming along, but also under pressure and external strains.

To the teachers, educators and staff who continued to provide a space for those children who were unable to stay at home during the isolation period, I offer my most heartfelt thanks. For the past few weeks, it's been wonderful to see all the children back at the kinder and things returning to normal. I hope, like me, you are all looking forward to making happy memories for our children to look back on, and when the restrictions lift, coming together even stronger as a community.

Music and Movement for Early childhood

Music ignites all areas of child development and skills for school readiness, including intellectual, social-emotional, motor, language, and overall literacy. It helps the body and the mind work together. Exposing children to music during early development helps them learn the sounds and meanings of words and strengthen memory skills.

At Thornbury kinder, music and singing is embedded into the pre kinder curriculum with the help of our music teacher, Katie Hull-Brown. We have Katie for singing fortnightly from term two but during these unprecedented times Katie still found a way to connect with our families via her music. Bush Kinder & Out and About Update

A different update for Bush Kinder and Out & About this term with most of us remaining at home and spending time with family. We hope our kinder families have made time to still get outside and enjoy time in nature locally. There have been some terrific rainy days to get out and enjoy over the last few weeks. As adults the rainy weather can be uncomfortable however it doesn't mean our children need to feel the same way. Children are drawn to muddy puddles – they love to jump in them, roll through them on bikes, float things in them and much more.

Here are 4 ways to enjoy a muddy puddle:

- 1. Puddle jumping With the proper clothing (or quick access to change of clothes) there is no greater fun for a kindergarten child to jump in puddles while it is raining! It is a fun way to develop the gross motor skills of jumping and stomping! Children also experience cause and effect and properties of water through this simple activity.
- 2. Floating and Sinking Use a puddle as a natural water table. Let your child explore properties of floating and sinking by experimenting with different items found outside. Does a leaf float in the puddle? What about a stick? Or a rock? This can lead to other experimentation and questioning. Why do ripples form when you drop a rock into a puddle? Children learn to make predictions and explore strategies for answering their questions through this type of play.
- 3. Puddle Music Rain has many sounds. Listening to rain on the roof and rain falling into a puddle are different experiences. A soft rain also sounds different from a hard rain. Try to replicate the sounds of rain using a pot or a wood block, a drum or a shaker. Here are some songs to sing on muddy puddle days.

Row, Row, Row Your Boat It's Raining, It's Pouring There's a Hole in the Bucket Singing in the Rain

Developing a sense of rhythm and rhyme are essential phonemic awareness skills – understanding and playing with the sounds of language. Music also plays with patterning, an early mathematical skill.



4. Puddle Stew – Children are able to use their environment to create play experiences with very little help from adults. We need to give them the opportunities to explore and the freedom to live out their ideas. Provide some buckets and scoops or spoons to use in puddle play to create an ooey, gooey, munchy, crunchy Wombat Stew! As children stir, pour, scoop, measure and serves their Stew, they also use rich language to describe the process. Children practice and build vocabulary and build confidence and self-regulation through imaginative play. Puddle stew also can incorporate measuring and fine motor development using measuring scoops and cups.

Puddles can provide endless fun and exploration. Put on your raincoat and head outside with your child on the next rainy day, and when the sun comes out, keep track of how long it takes for a puddle to evaporate! There is always something new to learn when we play in nature.

Child Safety

Belonging and Connectedness at Kinder. All children need to feel that their world is a safe place where people will care about them, where their needs for support, respect and friendship will be met, and where they will be able to get help to work out any problems. When these needs are met children develop a sense of belonging. As we welcome children and families back to kinder, staff are concentrating on reconnecting with you all.

We place a great emphasis on your children's sense of belonging at Thornbury Kinder. We know that children who feel that they belong are happier, more relaxed and are more successful learners. It is our intention to work together with families to create a bridge between home and kindergarten. Family involvement at kinder demonstrates to your child that kindergarten is highly valued, a safe place to be and promotes feelings of belonging and connectedness. Unfortunately we are unable to have parent helpers at kinder currently, however there are many ways to be involved.





Growing Healthy Minds



Some suggested ways to enhance your child and family's belonging and connectedness at kinder are:

- Share information about your child's likes, interests and preferences with your child's teacher and educator.
- Talk to your child about their day. Try to pick a time in the day when your child is feeling calm and relaxed – the car ride home may not be when your child when feels particularly talkative. Asking a specific question such as "Tell me about one fun thing you did at kinder" may get a better response than "What did you do at kinder today?".
- Keep in touch with your child's teacher and educator via phone.
- Stay connected with kinder families via your WhatsApp social group.
- Let us know if your child is having difficulties and discuss what kinds of things can be done both at home and at kinder to help.
